Preparing for The Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday—March 20

The Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week and is unique in our liturgical cycle. The liturgy begins outside as we gather with palm branches and hear the account of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. Once inside, the liturgy makes a dramatic shift as we turn to the reading of the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Within this liturgy, the joy of Palm Sunday guickly moves to the sadness of what happens to Jesus after the welcome parade is over. These shifts in mood remind us of the dramatic events that occurred between that triumphal entry and the death of Jesus on the cross. We humbly and reverently move through this liturgy giving thanks that Jesus Christ is God for us and acknowledging that his death is the reality that gives us salvation. Together we proclaim "Hosanna!" Save us, Lord.

THE THREE DAYS OF HOLY WEEK

Worship during The Three Days

- Mar. 24 Maundy Thursday Noon and 7:00 p.m.
- Mar. 25 Good Friday Noon and 7:00 p.m.
- Mar. 26 Holy Saturday/Vigil of Easter 7:00 p.m.

Thursday, March 24, marks the beginning of the shortest season in the liturgical year. This season is called The

Three Days. This season is also known as The Triduum. The Latin term Triduum means "three days." It is the three-day celebration of the death and resurrection of Jesus - Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and the Vigil of Easter. Each of The Three Days "tells" a different part of the story of Jesus' saving action.

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THE THREE DAYS OF HOLY WEEK CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

On <u>Maundy Thursday</u> we gather at Noon and at 7 PM. This liturgy includes four different emphases. First, we begin the service with confession and the opportunity for individual absolution. We end what we started on Ash Wednesday with what was absent then: a clear and personal statement of the gospel: "In obedience to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ, I forgive you all your sins." The second emphasis is the New Commandment (*mandatum*) that we love one another as he has loved us. It is from that commandment that this day receives its title. We will embody the command "to love one another" as we share in the washing of hands. The third emphasis is Jesus' gift of himself in the bread and cup and his commanding this as the way to remember him, the crucified and risen one. Finally, there is the foreshadowing of Good Friday with the stripping of the altar and leaving in silence at the end of the service.

When we return on <u>Good Friday</u> at Noon and at 7 PM it is to hear the passion according to John, sing the traditional hymns associated with the crucifixion, and to offer prayers for people in all conditions of life. The services focus on the contemplation and adoration of the cross, a means of death becomes the means of life and salvation. We will leave this service in silence.

On Saturday evening we will gather outside at 7 PM for the most ancient liturgy the Church has-the <u>Vigil of</u> <u>Easter</u>, the original celebration of Jesus' death and resurrection. It begins in the darkness of Good Friday with the striking of a new fire from which the paschal candle is lighted. We will process into the darkened church carrying this light of Christ. A song will be sung that proclaims the wonder of Christ and his resurrection, then we will listen to a series of Bible readings to remember God's prior actions to save his people. We will renew our baptismal promises as a sign of the way the hope of the resurrection comes into our lives. Then we will celebrate the resurrection with the Lord's Supper.

We look at The Triduum as one single celebration that lasts for three days. We do not spend all of the three days in church, but at various times during those days, we are called to church to gather and remember together. You are encouraged to make participating in worship during these Three Days a high priority in the time preceding Easter Sunday.



Uniting our Eyes, Ears, Hands, Hearts, and Lives in the Journey of Lent

The season of Lent is a journey. A journey with Jesus from life, to death, to life again. It's a journey for us as faithful followers of Jesus who also journey from life to death, to life again. And this year it's a journey for our congregation as many of us are engaged in reading the book *Unbinding Your Heart* and participating in small groups.

Along this journey, we are drawn into a deeper love of God, each other, and our neighbors. The journey to living out the great commandment to "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength" (Mark 12:30) involves the whole body, the whole body of an individual and the whole body of the congregation.

In your home devotions during this journey of Lent, I invite you to use this prayer every day so that the whole body is praying together.

PRAYER

Jesus Christ, this time of year we remember your time on earth. We remember your hunger and your time of prayer. Be with us now and open our eyes to all who hunger. We remember that you prayed and listened for God's voice. Be with us now and open our ears so we can hear what the hungry want us to know. We remember how you touched and healed all manner of people. Be with us now and open our hands to touch all who hunger. We remember how you loved all people. Be with us now and open our hearts to feel connected with all who hunger. We remember how your whole life was about teaching us about God. Be with us now and show us how to have life and have it more abundantly. Show us how to share that abundance with all who hunger. Walk with us during this Lenten Journey and help us to be changed and to bring change in the world. Amen.

Then, after the prayer, enter into a time of silence. You're invited to use the coloring page that is included in the newsletter (page 5) to be still and rest in the presence of God. Let this be a deliberate discipline so pace yourself by coloring a portion of the picture each week. Additional copies of the picture will be at the Welcome Center.

A TIME OF SILENCE

Bring color to what what was black and white. Walk with Jesus through the Labyrinth of your eye, your ear, your hands, your heart, and your life. With God's help, consider how you might see and hear things in a new way. Consider how you might pray in a new way. Consider how you might feel connected to all of creation in a new way. Consider how you might live abundantly with God's help. (When "walking" a paper labyrinth, trace the way to the middle, pause in prayer, and then trace the way out.)

We've Agreed to Become an Internship Site, Now What?

At the Annual Meeting on Sunday, Feb. 14, the congregation approved becoming an internship site for seminarians preparing to be pastors. The congregation also approved increasing the 2016 budget by \$17,000 to cover the associated expenses for 2016.

Here's an update on what's happened since that meeting and the process moving forward.

- 1) Our Congregation Application for an Intern has been submitted to Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary (LTSS).
- 2) The coordinator for internship assignments at the seminary reviews the applications from congregations willing to serve as a host site and the applications from potential interns to identify a good fit for both congregation and intern.
- 3) The coordinator will consult with the supervising pastors at the congregations to ensure that the potential matches are good fits.
- 4) The potential interns are notified about their internship assignments in late March.
- 5) After the seminarians know where they are assigned, the supervising pastor can inform the congregation about who they will be hosting.

Next Steps:

<u>Formation of an Internship Committee</u> – this committee would handle the logistics (housing, moving, etc.) of hosting an intern and would meet monthly with the intern to talk about what they are learning. They would participant in a mid-year and final evaluation process. Speak to Pastor Pam If you feel called to work closely with the intern.

<u>Arrival of the intern</u> – most likely the intern will begin their year of internship in August 2016. They may come for a visit before they begin their work among us. <u>Internship expectations</u> – it is expected that the intern will participate in every aspect of congregational life. This is a full-time position and will include one day off each week. He or she will preach, assist in worship, lead Bible study, teach classes, visit the sick and the homebound, attend committee and council meetings, plan worship, support ministries, and engage different aspects of parish administration.

<u>Financial considerations</u> – As always, regular and generous financial giving by everyone in the faith community is necessary throughout this year to support the spending plan of St. Philip. If you wish to make a contribution over and beyond your usual giving to support this new ministry, please note "internship" on the memo line.

Building Up Event

On Saturday, January 30, congregation council members, staff, and committee and small group leaders gathered for a leadership training event. The event was planned and organized by the Mutual Ministry team of St. Philip. The Rev. Doug Kearney, an interim pastor in the N.C. Synod, facilitated the event. The workshop included a short worship service and the sharing of Holy Communion.

The purpose of the event was to support, develop, and enable ministry leaders to help unleash the assets and gifts within St. Philip for the building up of the Body of Christ. In small table groups, the ministry leaders discussed the joyful aspects and the challenging aspects of church leadership. Some of the joys identified include: being part of a team, getting to know people, making a difference, and serving God and the community. Some of the challenges included: budget constraints, getting volunteers, and carving out time. Later in the workshop, the table groups explored and shared strategies for addressing the challenging aspects.

We talked together about organizational effectiveness and identified the need for us to be more intentional about how our different ministries relate to each other. It was noted that newcomers and members might see our congregational structure as various random and loosely configured ministries. This makes it extremely difficult for people to participate more fully in the life of the congregation. In a leadership exercise, a ball of yarn was randomly tossed across and around the large circled formed by 30 participants. This created a web of connectedness as we explored the relationships among us and acknowledging that it takes each one of us to accomplish the ministries of St. Philip. Then different people were asked to let go of the yarn demonstrating that when someone disengages the entire structure becomes more fragile.

Ministry leaders were given a toolkit to strengthen their work. This toolkit included resources for inviting others to participate in the various ministries, sample prayers and devotional materials, resources for facilitating the work of a group, and templates for communication. They also received a directory and a document summarizing all the different ways that members indicated a desire to participate in ministry.

Ministry leaders were challenged to grow their ministry by 10%! So, you may be getting a call from a ministry leader inviting YOU to participate in some way. God has called each one of us to St. Philip and has equipped us for the work that God gives us to do. <u>Your</u> unique skills, abilities and gifts are essential to the healthy functioning of St. Philip!


