Pastor's Message

The Three Days

My favorite season of the church year is the shortest one known as *The Three Days*, in Latin it is The Triduum. These three days begin at sunset on what we call Maundy Thursday and end at sunset on Easter Sunday, in between we have Good Friday and Holy Saturday. The Triduum is unique in the church's repertoire of liturgies in that it is a single liturgy that continues over a period of days with each day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's life, death, and resurrection.

For most of my life, I thought of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday as totally separate worship services which were basically disconnected from each other. This meant that some years we attended the Maundy Thursday service and other years we attended the Good Friday service depending on what fit best with our schedules. I can't think of a time when we attended both services in the same year until I entered seminary and began to learn more about the connection between these days.

I find the sweep of *The Three Days* to be the most solemn and most joyful liturgies of the year. They are packed full of the sights and sounds of the entire Christian faith. From confession, individual absolution, scripture readings, and hymnody to hand washing, holy communion, and the stripping of the altar. From the reading of the passion of Jesus to the glory of the cross we journey through the most solemn of days. *The Three Days* reaches it's high point at the Easter Vigil and then continues the joyous celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus for the next fifty days. March 2018 I attended my first Easter Vigil service while on internship at St. James in Fayetteville. I fell in love with the dynamics of this service and it has become

with the dynamics of this service and it has become my favorite liturgy of the church year. Beginning with a fire outdoors from which the paschal candle and our candles are lit creates a beautiful procession into the sanctuary. Hearing the Easter Proclamation that has been handed down to us from the fourth century unites us with the fullness of the Body of Christ. The scripture readings this night proclaim the depth and breadth of God's love for us and all creation. We affirm our baptisms together and standing in the light of the resurrection we receive Holy Communion. The Vigil of Easter is the final liturgy of *The Three Days* <u>AND</u> the first worship service in the season of Easter so it's the first time we declare that Christ is Risen! Alleluia.

Participating in the fullness of *The Three Days* deepens and strengthens my faith as the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus are brought together in glorious unity. No longer is his life or his death or is resurrection just a single event that stands alone. Experiencing *The Three Days* reminds me that it takes all of this, every action of God and every action of Jesus, to bring about God's redemption and reconciliation of creation.

I hope that you will join with me in marking *The Three Days* (March 29-31). Worship will be held at Noon and 7 pm on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. The Vigil of Easter will begin at 7 pm on Holy Saturday.

May the grace of God, Father, +Son, and Holy Spirit, hold you in love and fill you with peace!

Vicar's Message

I am in training. At the end of June I will have the privilege and delight of going to the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston, Texas with 28 youth and 4 other adults. The end of June is a hot, humid time in Houston, and Youth Gatherings are renowned for the amount of walking that they require. I started 21 weeks before we are scheduled to leave, walking up and down Falls of Neuse. I am slowly increasing the time I spend on those walks because I will need to be able to spend all day walking. If I can maintain discipline and walk three times per week, increasing the amount of time little by little, my body will get stronger. The more I walk, the longer I will be able to walk, and the better prepared I will be for Houston.

Lent is a kind of training time for understanding who we are in relation to God. During Lent we talk about disciplines: prayer, meditation, fasting, and other disciplines. Like with my walking, the more we pray, the more we are able to pray. The more we meditate on God's mercy, and grace, and love, the more we realize our own lack of mercy, lack of grace, and lack of love. We realize who we are relative to God. In coming to that realization, though, we come to find out exactly how much God loves us. In seeing our own inadequacy and brokenness, we see God's omnipotence and goodness. The more we know and love God, the more we are able to know and love God.

So for this Lent, I invite you into training with me. Walk, or exercise, or whatever form of activity you like – and I will rejoice with you as we get stronger together! But more important than physical training, I invite you to join me in training for relationship with God, slowly increasing the time we spend in prayer and getting to know God. The payoff is out of this world.

A Holy Conversation


On Sunday, February 18th, St. Philip hosted A *Holy Conversation* following a light lunch in Luther Hall.

How did this come about? At campfirmation last summer, Sydney Grantham, Grace Kindl, Jakson Attansio, Colin Reinhardt, and Willson Hooks decided that they are not okay with homophobia and, therefore, chose to do a service project based on fighting homophobia. A Holy Conversation was the result.

We invited 5 people from the local LGBTQ+ community to come and share



their stories with us. Pastor Sharon Taylor from Holy Trinity, Raleigh served as our facilitator. This was an extremely powerful and moving conversation from which we learned quite a bit. The panelists were also served by having a safe platform from which to share. As a result of this experience, one of our high school youth has invited a few of her friends in the LGBTQ+ community at her school to come and talk more with our youth group. The road to acceptance and understanding is paved with listening and sharing. Let us continue the journey!

March 7, 2018: You've Got a Problem! Your One-Hour Guide to Making Better Decisions

"Most people have just one or two styles of problem solving," says Lifetree representative Craig Cable. "This Lifetree program helps people identify their problem-solving style and discover the benefits of trying other techniques as well." During the program, Lifetree participants will consider current problems they're facing and explore new strategies for solving those problems.

March 14, 2018: In The News

The topic of the week will be something timely, taken from the current news. We won't know exactly what that topic will be – but it will be good!

March 21, 2018: **Do Good Dogs Go to Heaven? Questions About Animals and the Afterlife**

The session will feature a filmed interview with Dr. Kathleen Cooney, a veterinarian and founder of Home to Heaven, an in-home pet euthanasia service. "For the most part, people believe their pets are going to ascend to heaven and the moment death occurs, the soul is gone," Cooney says. "Others say dogs don't think, they react to things, so how can they be in heaven? Everybody has their own opinion."

During the session Lifetree participants will have an opportunity to discuss the times they've had to face the death of a beloved pet.

Introducing The Three Days

We look at the Three Days as one single worship celebration that lasts for three days. Each of the Three Days "tells" a different part of the story of Jesus' saving action. We cannot separate the death of Jesus from his resurrection. The faith community gathers at various times during these days to remember and give thanks together. You and your family are invited and encouraged to experience the fullness of the Three Days by participating in each of the worship services. To miss one of these worship services is to miss part of God's story in Jesus. May God bless our journey, give us peace, and bring us to the fullness of faith!

Maundy Thursday

The title "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for command: Jesus' command that we are to love one another. Maundy Thursday is the first of the Three Days. On this day, we tell the story of the Passover from Exodus 12; the story of the Last Supper from 1 Corinthians; and the story of Jesus' last meal with his disciples from the Gospel of John where we are called to love one another by serving one another in Christ's new covenant of love. We enact the meaning of Maundy Thursday in a variety of ways: a longer rite of confession and forgiveness; an opportunity for hand washing where we signify our love and service to one another; the celebration of Holy Communion, and the stripping of the altar. We leave worship in silence as we are being made ready for Good Friday.

Good Friday

This second of the Three Days is a day of paradox. One would think that the day commemorating the execution of a messiah would be kept in complete mourning. However, our worship on this day is marked not by excessive sorrow, as if we are pretending that Christ is still dead, but rather by solemn devotion. For even on this day we assemble as people of the resurrection. We acknowledge the cross before us as God's gift of life. On this day, we read the entire Passion of Jesus from the Gospel of John where the death of Jesus, is paradoxically the triumph of Christ. We enact the meaning of Good Friday, through the ways that we reverence the Cross, through our prayers, and through a worship service that ends simply as we depart in silence.

The Vigil of Easter

Just as the festivities for Christmas begin on Christmas Eve. the celebration of Easter begins at the Vigil of Easter. The service begins with the striking of a fire and the lighting of candles for everyone. Our candles proclaim the resurrection of Christ as a timeless event even now occurring. At this the third of the Three Days, we experience together the story of salvation. In this joyful worship service, we hear the stories of faith, sing the songs of the tradition, affirm our baptisms, share the bread and wine, and so be joined together with Christ as the light of the world. This full worship service ends in joy and thanksgiving for the entire assembly who gathers, not to wait, but to celebrate the resurrection.

Easter Sunday

Every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord because "on this day" as the Eucharistic Prayer of Thanksgiving states, Christ rose from the dead. So, what makes Easter Sunday worship so special? After journeying through the 40 days of Lent and The Three Days we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus with renewed thankfulness, hope, and excitement. Our celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord is so completely central to our faith that The Season of Easter lasts for 50 days. During this season, we will give thanks for the gift of baptism rather than offer confession and we will stand in the light of the resurrection while receiving communion rather than taking the penitential stance of kneeling. We gather on this day, like we do on all other Sundays, to give thanks to God for the salvation that God has prepared for us through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Empowered by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God proclaimed, the waters of baptism that makes us new creations, and the meal of Christ's body and blood, we are strengthened and sent out to bear Christ's redeeming love to the world.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

An Invitation to a Time of Holy Solitude

March 24, 9 am - Noon

You're invited to a time of Holy Solitude at a quiet retreat which will be held at St. Philip on Holy Saturday, March 24, from 9 am – Noon. The quiet retreat is a meaningful way to mark the time between the solemnness of Good Friday and joyfulness of Easter Sunday.

So often we come to church because there is something to do: worship, choir practice, handbell practice, property work days, Sunday School, Bible Study, ministry team meetings, youth group, fellowship opportunities, and community service activities like Brown Bag Ministry. All these things are good and necessary for building up the Body of Christ. They enable us to come to God in worship, offering our thanks and our prayers, hearing the word of God proclaimed in word and song, and celebrating the sacraments. They help us care for our facility and the ministry that God gives us to do. They draw us together as a faith community growing in faith, strengthening our relationships with one another, and caring for those in need.

Wouldn't it be a blessing, though, to come to church simply to be in the presence of God? God longs to spend time with you, uninterrupted time. The quiet retreat provides intentional time to be in the presence of God in the peaceful sanctuary of St. Philip.

At this retreat, you are invited to practice the spiritual discipline of keeping silence as you engage in a variety of activities. Come to pray, reflect, meditate, read, create, write and rest in the presence of God.

We begin the retreat with an opening prayer in the Sanctuary at 9:00 am and end the retreat with a concluding prayer at noon. In between, the time will be unstructured inviting you to move about at your own pace and need. Suggestions for ways to spend your time during the retreat will be provided when you arrive. Materials will be provided for you to make prayer beads, create a collage, read, write, and color. You may participate in as much of the retreat as you desire.



We welcome anyone interested in reading and discussing books. If you have questions, please contact <u>Kathryn Edwards</u> or <u>Carol Williamson</u>.



late September. Speak to Pastor Pam or Kathy Blum if you're interested in learning more about becoming a Stephen Minister.




Sasha's Story
