On Easter Sunday, April 16, and through the 50 days that follow we will declare with joy that "Christ is risen!" Let's explore what we're saying when we speak these words.

CHRIST: This title for Jesus is a Greek translation of the Hebrew word Messiah, meaning "anointed one." So, to be the Christ, or Messiah, is to be the "anointed one of God." Declaring Jesus to be the Christ is saying that the one who became flesh and dwelled among us, the one whom God declared his beloved Son, the one who turned water into wine, the one who healed the sick and restored the people on the margins, the one who washed the feet of his disciples, the one who was crucified, died, and was buried is the same one God raised from the dead.

IS: This little word is so important to our understanding of God's ongoing action in Jesus. We don't say, "Christ was risen!" as if it was a single event long ago that has no relevance for us today. Instead we say, "Christ IS risen!" Is risen and appears to Mary and the women who come to care for his body. Is risen when he appears to his disciples in that upper room. Is risen when he breaks bread with the men on the way to Emmaus. Is risen yesterday, today, and all the tomorrows to come.

RISEN: In the bold action of raising Jesus from the dead, God shows strength and power that is greater and stronger than everything else in all creation. To say that Christ is risen means that his death was not in vain, that in his resurrection the power of death and the grave has been conquered. To say that Christ is Risen is to say that Jesus has once again entered the world in a real and tangible way.

Declaring that Christ is Risen! allows us to share this incredible truth with each other. Consider it a word of blessing, a reminder of the promise of God to be with us always. There is power in these words. Will you try something with me? Instead of greeting each other with a "hello" or some variation of that, could we, at least for the season of Easter, greet one another in a different way? Maybe something like this: one person will say "Christ is Risen!" and the other person will respond "He is Risen indeed!" I suspect that in this exchange we will each experience a deep sense of peace in God's ongoing mercy and grace.

As we exchange this greeting we are discovering or rediscovering a new post-resurrection life and reality: Christ is with us. Behind closed doors, in our doubt, on our journey, in water, bread, and wine, the Risen Christ calls us to follow, going before us to prepare the way, bringing peace, breathing the Spirit on us, so that we may tell this story to people of every land and nation.

May the presence of the Risen Christ fill you with peace and joy all the days of your life,

We don't need to wait until a child can describe exactly what happens in the meal in order to know that it is the "right" time for them to begin receiving the sacrament. Holy Communion is a gift of God for the people of God. Baptized children are part of this family of God and God invites them to come and eat. We believe that baptism and communion are gifts of God's grace that we do nothing to earn. This is one of many reasons we baptize infants. Thus, because God's grace is freely poured out upon children who are baptized, God's grace can surely be poured out on children who commune.

A First Communion Class will be held on <u>Saturday</u>. April 8 from 10:00 am until 11:00 am in the <u>sanctuary</u>. At this class, we will talk about how we are made God's children in baptism and how God comes to us in Holy Communion. We will look at the different vessels that are used in the communion liturgy, visit the sacristy, and taste the bread and wine/grape juice. This interactive class involves parents and their children. Children who complete the First Communion Class may receive their first communion at either service beginning on April 9.

Introducing The Three Days

We look at the Three Days as one single worship celebration that lasts for three days. Each of the Three Days "tells" a different part of the story of Jesus' saving action. We cannot separate the death of Jesus from his resurrection. The faith community gathers at various times during these days to remember and give thanks together.

You and your family are invited and encouraged to experience the fullness of the Three Days by participating in each of the worship services. To miss one of these worship services is to miss part of simply as we depart in silence. God's story in Jesus. May God bless our journey, give us peace, and bring us to the fullness of faith!

Maundy Thursday

The title "Maundy" comes from the Latin word for command: Jesus' command that we are to love one another. Maundy Thursday is the first of the Three Days. On this day, we tell the story of the Passover from Exodus 12; the story of the Last Supper from 1 Corinthians; and the story of Jesus' last meal with his disciples from the Gospel of John where we are called to love one another by serving one another in Christ's new covenant of love.

We enact the meaning of Maundy Thursday in a variety of ways: a longer rite of confession and forgiveness; an opportunity for hand washing where we signify our love and service to one another; the celebration of Holy Communion, and the stripping of the altar.

We leave worship in silence as we are being made ready for Good Friday.

Good Friday

This second of the Three Days is a day of paradox. One would think that the day commemorating the execution of a messiah would be kept in complete mourning. However, our worship on this day is marked not by excessive sorrow, as if we are pretending that Christ is still dead, but rather by solemn devotion. For even on this day we assemble as people of the resurrection. We acknowledge the cross before us as God's gift of life.

On this day, we read the entire Passion of Jesus from the Gospel of John where the death of Jesus, is paradoxically the triumph of Christ. We enact the meaning of Good Friday, through the

ways that we reverence the Cross, through our prayers, and through a worship service that ends

The Vigil of Easter

Just as the festivities for Christmas begin on Christmas Eve, the celebration of Easter begins at the Vigil of Easter. The service begins with the striking of a fire and the lighting of candles for everyone. Our candles proclaim the resurrection of Christ as a timeless event even now occurring. At this the third of the Three Days, we experience together the story of salvation. In this joyful worship service, we hear the stories of faith, sing the songs of the tradition, affirm our baptisms, share the bread and wine, and so be joined together with Christ as the light of the world. This full worship service ends in joy and thanksgiving for the entire assembly who gathers, not to wait, but to celebrate the resurrection.

Easter Sunday

Every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord because "on this day" as the Eucharistic Prayer of Thanksgiving states, Christ rose from the dead. So, what makes Easter Sunday worship so special? After journeying through the 40 days of Lent and The Three Days we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus with renewed thankfulness, hope, and excitement. Our celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord is so completely central to our faith that The Season of Easter lasts for 50 days. During this season, we will give thanks for the gift of baptism rather than offer confession and we will stand in the light of the resurrection while receiving communion rather than taking the penitential stance of kneeling.

We gather on this day, like we do on all other Sundays, to give thanks to God for the salvation that God has prepared for us through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Empowered by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God proclaimed, the waters of baptism that makes us new creations, and the meal of Christ's body and blood, we are strengthened and sent out to bear Christ's redeeming love to the world.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

 Sharon is in the nursery if your child would enjoy playing in there.



Echrupry 2017

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

You may recall from my comments last month, that together and with God's provision, we had our best January ever in terms of total income (giving). I am pleased to report that giving for February was the best ever for that month too... at least that any of us on Council or the Finance Committee can recall. On the other hand, the amount was down from the record January and further behind our plan as well. While we are grateful for our trend compared to past years, we must also keep in mind that total income is now \$12,780 behind plan year to date. Expenses are under plan as well, but by a lesser amount.
