Pastor's Message

On Christmas Eve, we will hear this reading from Isaiah, the 9th chapter:

⁶For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.

For us as Christians, these words from the prophet Isaiah point us directly to Jesus. They point us directly to the baby boy who was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born to Mary. They point us to the little boy who was raised in Nazareth by Mary and Joseph. The same boy who frightened his parents when he was not where he was supposed to be. They point us to the fully human and fully divine Jesus whose life, death, and resurrection forever changed our standing before God.

I rest securely on the names for Jesus that are given in this beloved passage: Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. Each one tells me a little more about who Jesus is and how Jesus relates to me and all of God's people. He is the Wonderful Counselor who wants only good things for us and so journeys with us in the ups and downs of life.

He is the Mighty God who was present at creation, who became flesh and dwelt among us, who defends us from sin, death, and the power of the devil. He is the Everlasting Father whose grace, compassion, and faithfulness has no end. He is the Prince of Peace who enters our troubled spirits bringing the peace, wholeness, that surpasses all understanding.

My friends, we live in the already and not yet of God's promises. Jesus, the Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace, has already entered this world and our lives. He has already exercised his authority and changed everything. We also live in the not yet of God's actions as we wait, wait for the fulfillment of all that God has done, is doing, and promises yet to do. The season of Advent and the short season of Christmas, wrap us in the coming of Jesus: his first coming as child who was given FOR us; and his second coming to complete what has already been done.

May the hope of Advent and the joy of Christmas fill your hearts and minds with peace!

Then, a year from now, we will be back at this starting place, ready to remember once again that this amazing baby Jesus lived his whole life for the express purpose of showing us how to live, teaching us to love, and making it possible by his Resurrection for us to be part of the kingdom of God even in a most egregiously broken world.

No matter if this is a season of wonder or a season of pain for you, Jesus is caring for you, drawing you to himself, and keeping you in all good grace.

Worship in December

On the 3rd Sunday of Advent, (Dec. 17th), both services will celebrate that God is turning our mourning into laughter and shouts of joy with the coming of Jesus. We'll hear the story of John the Baptist who proclaims that he comes to testify to the light. John directs attention away from himself to Christ, the true light.

Also on Dec. 17th, we will hold our annual service of longing and hope; our Blue Christmas service.

When the 4th Sunday of Advent and Christmas Eve both fall on December 24th it creates an interesting juggling act. Here at St. Philip, we will mark the 4th Sunday of Advent in a combined service at 10 am in the sanctuary. At this service, we'll light the last blue candle in the Advent wreath and hear the annunciation by the angel Gabriel to Mary. Our final hymn that morning will be "Joy to the World" as we celebrate the coming of our Lord

Christmas Eve at St. Philip

As you drive into the parking lot --

your eyes capture the warm glow of lighted candles shining through the windows...

When you walk up the paved brick entry --

your ears catch phrases of seasonal carols accompanied in a variety of ways, some played on the church organ, others from the piano, and still others from guitar and drums...

Inside the Sanctuary and in Kepley Hall surrounded by intergenerational worshippers --

your voice joins in singing Christmas hymns, some classics that have been cherished through centuries and others more recent contributions to our Christmas celebration.

Each of the three services on Christmas Eve will be unique:

At the 4:00 pm service, we'll begin outside with a live nativity. We'll welcome Farmer Mary from Winterpast Farm in Wake Forest who will be bringing a ram, some goats, and maybe even a sheep or two. Ba Ba the Ram is featured in the photo! Arrive about 3:30 so that you can interact with the animals. Children will be invited to wear a simple costume as we tell the story of the birth of Christ.

Following the nativity story, we'll follow Mary, Joseph, and the baby Jesus into the Sanctuary where we'll sing more carols, celebrate Holy Communion, and conclude the service with candle lighting and the singing of "Silent Night."



The 7:00 pm contemporary worship service will be held in Kepley Hall. The

Christmas Gospel will be shared through readings, familiar carols, and by more recent contributions to the repertoire of Christmas music led by the Crossing musicians. The service will include the celebration of Holy Communion and will conclude with candle lighting and the singing of "Silent Night."

The a 9:00 pm traditional worship service will be held in the Sanctuary. The Christmas Gospel will include many of the most revered sacred hymns and carols celebrating our Savior's birth. With music led from the organ, seasonal choral anthems will be offered by Voices of Praise Adult Choir. The service will include the celebration of Holy Communion and will conclude with candle lighting and the singing of "Silent Night."

The Senior Ministry Book Club will not meet during them month of December, but will resume


meeting on <u>Tuesday</u>, <u>January 23, 2018</u>, <u>at 10:00am</u> in the church Parlor.

Let's Welcome Mackenzie and her family to St. Philip!



Hi! My name is Mackenzie Noecker and I will be 7 years old on December 16th. I have a lot of nicknames. People call me 'Mac', 'Big Mac', 'Miss Mac', 'Mackie' and 'Mackenzie'. I am a big sister and a little sister! Libby is 4.5, Sloane is 21, Alexis and Slade are 23! I love my Mommy, Daddy, Grammy, Pop-Pop, Grandpop, Miss Chris, 10 aunts/uncles and 6 cousins.

I am in Kindergarten at North Ridge Elementary. My favorite color is green and I love to eat strawberries! I take dance. I am a Girl Scout. I love to swim, play dress up, go to the beach, play outside, and read books. I like music, and recently started Joyful Noise Kids Choir.

I can smile, giggle, cry, and vocalize feelings, but generally, I use my eyes to communicate. When I don't have my Tobii eye gaze device with me, it is easiest to communicate with me by asking me yes/no questions. I will look at you for 'yes' and look away for 'no'. But please give me a few seconds to respond!

From my parents (Gwen and Scott): Mackenzie is much like other girls her age; however, she is trapped in a body that doesn't cooperate for her. Mackenzie was diagnosed with Rett syndrome at the age of 22 months. Rett syndrome is a postnatal neurological disorder that is randomly occurring, and caused by mutations on the X chromosome on a gene called MECP2. Rett syndrome strikes all racial and ethnic groups, and occurs worldwide in ~1 of every 10,000 female births. Rett syndrome causes problems in brain function that are responsible for sensory, emotional, motor and autonomic function. Rett syndrome symptoms appear after an early period of apparently normal or near normal development until six to eighteen months of life, when there is a slowing down or stagnation of skills. A period of regression then follows.

There currently are neither treatments, nor a cure for Rett syndrome. In 2016, Mackenzie was one of \sim 90 girls in the world who participated in a phase 2 clinical trial for the first possible drug to treat Rett syndrome. A phase 3 trial for this same drug is set for 2018 and we are hopeful that Mackenzie will be amongst the participants in that trial as well.

Mackenzie's biggest challenges at this time are her inability to purposefully use her hands, atypical expressive language, breathing abnormalities, and instability when walking. What we'd like people to know most about Mackenzie is that she hears you, and she understands you, even though she may be challenged at times to acknowledge or respond to you.



Calling all Middle and High School youth, it's time to get registered for the LYO Assembly!!! February 23-25, \$75



Finance Committee Chair's Message

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

In several Epistles this year I have kept you posted on how our actual giving has lagged behind our approved budget. As you may recall, we have been running a fair amount behind plan all year. This trend has generally continued, and through October our income (giving) was nearly \$70,000 under plan. On the bright side, expenses through the same period were also significantly less than we had budgeted. The Finance Committee has gone through an exercise of carefully estimating what our expenses should be for the remainder of the year. From that exercise, we believe expenses will be in the range of \$130,000. If our income in November and December were to be at average levels, we could find ourselves short in the range of \$60,000.

While those of you who have been at St. Philip for a long time know our giving tends to increase measurably late in the year, especially in December, it appears to the Finance Committee and Council that without a special effort, we will fall short of our needed income. We want to make sure we meet all our obligations, continue our important ministries, set money aside to maintain our facilities and start 2018 on solid footing.

We are announcing a special catch up campaign to accomplish the above, with the goal of eliminating the potential \$60,000 shortfall. We are asking that you pray about this issue and if you are so led, please give what you are able to this effort to fully fund the good work of St. Philip. There are envelopes for your use in the Narthex and in the area of Kepley Hall. Each is decorated with a picture of a stocking. You can select one with the amount you wish to give or take a blank one and use for any amount. Every gift, large or small will make a difference.

While the additional giving needed to meet our plan is substantial, with God's help, I am confident we have the capacity to meet this challenge. Our church is blessed with wonderful, generous members and we have the potential not only to reach this goal, but also to meaningfully expand our ministries in the future. Coincidentally, the potential shortfall is exactly as it was last year and our congregation responded faithfully to reach the challenge.
