## Pastor's Message

There seems to be a lot of anxiety in our lives these days. We worry about our health and the health of those we love. We worry about the state of our nation and what's happening in the world around us. We worry about finances. We worry about the environment with wildfires, earthquakes, floods, and drought affecting people in lots of places. We worry about those who are suffering in some way. We worry about personal safety. We worry about the state of the Church and our own faith community. Anxiety abounds.

With so much uncertainty and anxiety in the air, I turn to scriptures like these:

*<sup>5</sup>Trust in the LORD with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. (Proverbs 3)*

*<sup>7</sup>Cast all your anxiety on him, because he cares for you. (1 Peter 5)*

*<sup>28</sup>Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. (Matthew 11)*

*<sup>34</sup>Therefore do not be anxious about tomorrow, for tomorrow will be anxious for itself. Sufficient for the day is its own trouble." (Matthew 6)*

We live in a culture that tells us we must be self-sufficient and be able to handle everything by ourselves. That we should be strong enough to deal with whatever comes our way, to face our struggles and resolve our challenges. This way of thinking and being in the world tends to isolate us from each other as we each try to go it by ourselves.

The good news is that this is not the way that God intends for us to be in this world. The texts above remind me, and I hope you, that we are not expected to carry our anxieties and burdens on our own. God cares about us and wants to help us carry our burdens, wants to be the source and the giver of our peace and rest.

These comforting scriptures have the power to settle our nerves, to calm our fears, and to restore our peace. Yet, fully entrusting ourselves to the care of God is challenging. I know for me, I will hand my burdens over to God only to turn around and pick them back up again. Maybe that happens in your life too.

One of the remedies to this yoyo effect, this giving up and taking back of our burdens, is prayer; resting in the presence of God while we face the stressors in our lives. Jesus invites us to come to him, to cast our anxieties on him, to let him help us bear our burdens.

A prayer: Sustaining God, sometimes our lives are full of stress and anxiety which weigh us down and keep us from fully enjoying the life you have given to us. Help us to carry our burdens and give to us all that we need to meet the challenges of each day. Forgive us when we call on you to be our helper and then turn away from you to go our own way. Wrap your loving Spirit around us, sustain us each day by your mercy, and guide us in the ways of peace. In Jesus name we pray. Amen.

## Fall Bible Studies—The Prophets

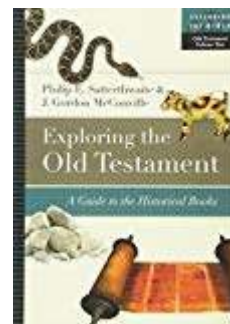
This fall we begin a survey of the Old Testament major and minor prophets beginning with Isaiah and continuing through Malachi.

A prophet is a spokesperson for God. The prophet comments on life. A prophet might chastise, moralize, advise, and speak of the present and of the future. The prophet's eye is directed to the contemporary scene making the society and its conduct the main themes of the prophet's speeches. Yet the prophet's ear is inclined to God. The phrase "thus says the LORD" is characteristic of the language of the prophets. Israel's prophets preach to a contemporary audience. They are concerned with the here and now of their time.

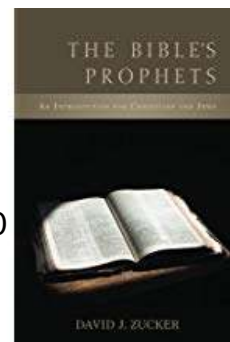
In this study, we'll explore the historical contexts into which the prophets are speaking. We'll also think about how the prophets were heard within their Jewish context to further the ideas and ideals of Judaism and how the Christian scriptures utilized the Hebrew Bible to further the ideas and ideals of Christianity.

The Bible will be our primary resource.

A commentary *Exploring the Old Testament: A Guide to Prophets* by J. Gordon McConville may be helpful in this study. Paperback copies are available from Amazon for \$18.25. You may also download a Kindle version for \$9.99.



Another resource, though more expensive, may also be helpful. It's called *The Bible's Prophets: An Introduction for Christian and Jews* and is available from Barnes and Noble in paperback for \$31.00 and as an ebook for \$10.49.

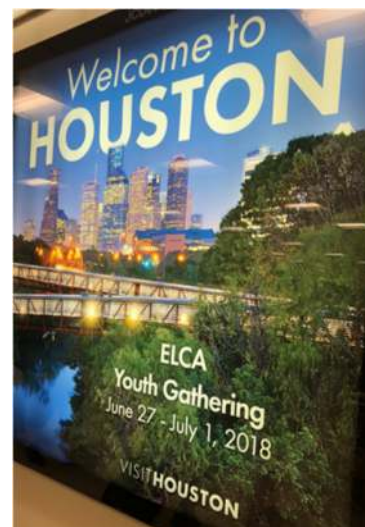
## Director of High School & Transitional Ministries...a message from Cathryn

## Mass gatherings

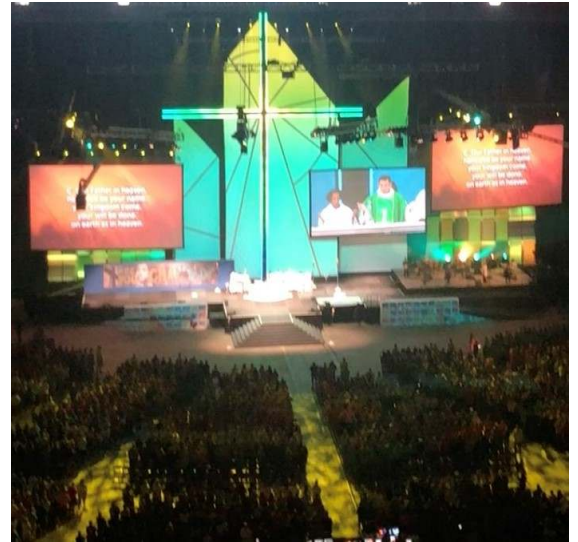

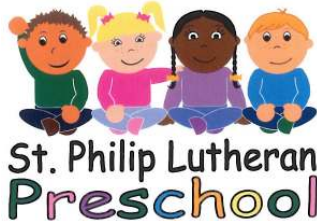
### Children's Worship

As the families we serve move from homelessness to home, the Families Together team checks in and checks up for a year to make sure they don't fall back into homelessness. One way we're doing this is by helping to bridge the gap that families face with regard to food, supplies and transportation.

**Food Gap**-After finding a permanent place to call home, parents must ensure they can put enough food on the table for their children. Sometimes difficult choices between paying the rent and buying groceries are made. To help avoid this, you can help keep our emergency pantry shelves stocked with supplemental groceries so that no one in our program goes hungry. Use the attached Pantry list if you'd like to participate by donating food. Please note: Whenever possible, purchase low or no salt options to support the health and nutrition of the families we serve.

**Transportation Gap** - For families experiencing homelessness, transportation is a major obstacle to getting to jobs, medical appointments, and grocery stores. We're introducing a unique way you can help alleviate that. Families Together has started the Ride Together program for people we serve to get to that important job interview or that critical doctor's appointment. Would you be willing to provide a lift on occasion? By volunteering, you can be the difference in families getting to potentially life-changing destinations. **School Gap** - Each summer we hold a backpack and school supply drive for the children who are currently in our program, as well as those who arrive throughout the year. Help us provide needed supplies for kids in our community. Education is the key to break the cycle of poverty, by providing new school supplies. You can ensure a fresh start to the year for local children! We need backpacks and supplies for the full range of age groups.

### Car Donation Needed

Families Together needs a well-maintained, fuel-efficient used car for our Mentor Advocates to use on home visits to families that have recently moved from shelter to permanent housing. Our mileage reimbursement costs have increased significantly because families have to move further out to find housing they can afford. If you have a car you'd like to donate, this is a great way to help improve the lives of children and families as they move from homelessness to independence. Because the car will be used directly on our program work and not auctioned, it will provide the maximum tax deductibility allowed for the generous donor that steps forward. ## NC Synod—Assembly 2018

On June 1<sup>st</sup> Mark Tarquinio and I along with Pastor Pam, Pastor Elizabeth and Vicar Sharon gathered with some 500 other clergy and lay persons for the 2018 North Carolina Synod Assembly. This year it was held right here in Raleigh.

If you have never attended an Assembly, these are like no other. In many ways it is like a large “family” reunion. Pastors and lay workers in the church who have been friends for years may only get to see each other at a Synod Assembly. This is even the case for me. I grew up with and worked at summer camp with many of the men and women who are not pastors throughout the state. It was wonderful to greet and catch up with so many that I have not seen in a while.

Of course, Synod Assembly isn’t just about renewing friendships. We all worship and commune together to open Assembly. To hear a room full of clergy belting out the hymns is awe inspiring. Being in communion and sharing Holy Communion with so many, from so many walks of life fills one with joy, peace and love.

No, Synod Assembly isn’t just about renewal, singing hymns and worship. This is where we discuss the work of the church and make decisions that need to be made as a whole. This is where we elect persons in various positions. This year was not an election year for the Bishop and honestly was not a year presenting anything of great controversy. Some years are full of discussions, disagreements and tough decision making, but fortunately this was not one of them. We, the voting members of the NC Synod did vote for clergy and lay persons to represent us at the 2019 Churchwide Assembly being held next August in Milwaukee WI.

We also voted for both clergy and lay persons to serve on board of trustees for the organizations we support and sponsor such as Camp Agape’, Novus Way Ministries, Lenoir-

Rhyne University, Lutheran Services Carolinas and Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. Synod Council and Synod Officers were also elected into positions of North Carolina Synod leadership.

Throughout the 2-day Assembly with heard reports from all of our Lutheran organizations but one of the focal points was hearing about the outreach ministries that are taking place in our state from Durham, to Charlotte and into Cherokee. These ministries created and expanding to reach many diverse groups of people and to share faith in places where faith and fellow believers can be hard to find. Sometimes in all of our hard work in our own congregation in Raleigh striving to share our faith and God’s love, we forget that there are others across the state doing the same thing in a multitude of ways from serving children in need of homes, to sending young people to camp, helping refugees, and people caught up in a rough city life all the way to serving our elderly. We may not always be able to see it but the Lutheran Church has a great and vast presence in doing God’s work throughout North Carolina and beyond.

It was my joy and pleasure to serve St. Philip as a lay voting member to our North Carolina Synod Assembly. I thank you all for the opportunity to do so.

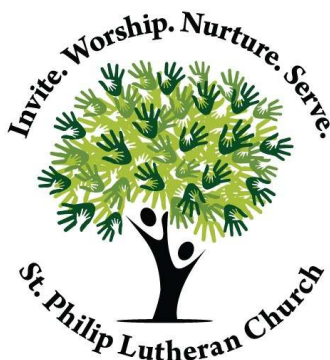
