Planting Hope Task Force

Once in a generation does a congregation have the opportunity to rediscover how it can live out its mission from God, discover how God is really working in the congregation, and listen and discern how a changed church can affect the world. This is the time for St. Philip as we launch Planting Hope. We are blessed to have all of the NC ELCA Synod's resources at our disposal for this exciting journey. The Planting Hope process works if we follow the Synod guidelines and allow it to work through God's grace. The Planting Hope Task Force is determined to make it work by engaging every member of our congregation to discern our real purpose and future direction. Planting Hope is the result of the NC ELCA Synod work to design a dynamic 18 to 24 month program to help "declining" Lutheran churches in NC discover the path to long term viability, vitality and sustainability. If we continue to do the same thing over and over and expect a different outcome we will never reach our potential. We need to look at our future in a different way. We can lift up our entire congregation and let God's light shine through all of us, like light shining through a stained glass window. We can then show the world God's love and change the world in the process. So, the purpose of Planting Hope is to help congregations discover and live out their mission from God. We are engaging in a "spiritual transformation" like nothing St. Philip has seen before.

St. Philip was invited as one of 4 congregations in eastern NC to participate in this program funded by an Eli Lilly grant. In April of 2018, Pastor Pam selected 7 members to be the Planting Hope Task Force (two members have since had to step away). The Task Force members are: Mike Fagan (Chair), Linda Colley, Sandy Glass, Joe Edwards and John Sullivan.

Our Triangle Conference Coach is Heidi Kleine from Christ the King. Six Synod advisors are also on the team.

The first Planting Hope Training session with Synod was held on 5/3/18. The Eli Lilly Grant included a Congregational Vitality Survey that was completed by St. Philip (132 responses) in May of 2018. Our Task Force's first meeting was on 7/11/18 and we then engaged in an 8 week Bible study of Acts. On 10/5/18 the Task Force and members of Church Council met to review the results of the Survey. The second training session with Synod was held on 10/6/18. The Task Force met for our first working session on 11/8/18 and our second on 11/15/18.

We have scheduled two meetings to share the results of the Congregational Vitality Survey on 11/30/18 at 7:00 pm and 12/1/18 at 10:00 am in Luther Hall. Everyone is strongly encouraged to attend one of these sessions.

Where do we go from here? It is now time to engage the congregation. That means every member of our congregation. We are being guided by God, period, so we do not know where this will lead us. We have no preconceived blueprint. Planting Hope is a specifically structured, unique program designed by the ELCA to help restore vitality and sustainability into congregations. It has a long history of success in this area. You are the key to this success. The Planting Hope Task Force is only the vehicle to get every one of us engaged in our church's new purpose and future.


Each of the three services on Christmas Eve will be unique:



The youth will also enjoy a banquet together, and our youth will choose their theme for the event.






Senior Adult Book Club

Men's Pub Ministry



Message from the Finance Committee

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

In the June Epistle we brought to your attention that our income had gotten behind plan more than in previous years. Our expenses were below plan also, but not to the same degree as income. We said that the Finance Committee and Council would be monitoring the situation closely. In mid-August, we sent a letter to all members communicating our continuing concern regarding our finances and that we were taking steps to reduce expenses for the remainder of the year. These steps have been effective in preventing us from getting even further behind; however, giving has not increased enough to make meaningful progress in reducing the shortfall between income and expenses.

Those of you who have been at St. Philip for a long time know our giving tends to increase measurably late in the year, especially in December.

However, unless we get that strong surge in income as we close out the year and without a special effort, it appears we could fall as much as \$70,000 short of balancing income and expenses, including setting aside much-needed reserves to maintain our facilities. We want to make sure we meet all our obligations, continue our important ministries,

set money aside to maintain our facilities and start 2019 on solid footing. Last year we were unable to fully fund our reserves which makes it doubly important to do so this year.

Therefore, we are again announcing a special catch up campaign to accomplish the above, with the goal of eliminating the potential \$70,000 shortfall. We are asking that you pray about this issue and if you are so led, please give what you are able to this effort to fully fund the good work of St. Philip. There will be envelopes for your use in the narthex and in the back of Kepley Hall. Each is decorated with a picture of a stocking. You can select one with the amount you wish to give or take a blank one and use for any amount. Every gift, large or small will make a difference.

While the additional giving needed to meet our plan is substantial, with God's help, I am confident we have the capacity to meet this challenge. Our church is blessed with wonderful, generous members and we have the potential not only to reach this goal, but also to meaningfully expand our ministries in the future.


