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# Message from Pastor Elizabeth, Director of C.M.S.M. (Children & Middle School Ministries) Children's Sunday School

Although Valentines Day has never been a favorite holiday of mine, I do appreciate the theme of love. It pushes me to think about warmth in the midst of the cold and comfort in the midst of discomfort. Spending lots of time with a small person makes me think about the variety of ways that we show and receive love. Have you thought about that lately? What might it look like to show your love to someone? Does it look like gift-giving? Or helping with tasks? Does it look like time together? Or words of affirmation? Does it sound like a mushy hallmark card? Or a funny one? How do you show love? Conversely, what do you need to feel someone's love for you? Do you need gifts? Or help? Do you want time together? Or words of affirmation? How do you receive love?

Have you ever thought about that in the context of your family? Do you show love in the same ways your loved ones receive love? Or do you sometimes miss each other by showing and receiving love in different ways? Now, what about your church family? What does it look like to show your love to your church family... attendance? words? time? involvement? financial support? How do you feel love from your church family?

Now, what about the God's love? We \*know\* God loves us, we can sing about it and use the right words, but how do we experience it? Do you feel God's love in the warmth of a sunbeam? Or see it in the colors of a sunrise or sunset? Do you feel God's love when you are frightened or alone? I'm reminded of a Veggie Tales song... "God is bigger than the boogie-man... and he's watching over you and me!" And what do you do when you feel God's love? Do you hold it close, just for yourself or do you share it with others? How do you share it with others?

As we head through this season of pink and red hearts, I encourage you to think about how you share the love of God and how you experience the love of God. Think about God's love as an active and living thing and watch how it grows as it is shared. Look for God's love everywhere and consider ways to share it so that others may also know God's love.

#### Where will we stay while serving?

#### What does a typical day look like?

A typical day begins breakfast and devotions by 9am, followed by serving at a worksite until around 3pm. The day concludes with worship, a time for church groups to check-in, and a little more free time before lights out. Sleep fast after a full, fun and meaningful day!

These events take advantage of some of the cultural attractions in the community we are serving, as well as simply providing opportunity to be social and get to know and spend time with old and new friends alike.

## **Planting Hope Update**

The St. Philip Planting Hope initiative is alive and well in 2019 and off to a great start! Planting Hope is the result of the NC ELCA Synod's work to design a dynamic 18-24 month program to help "declining" churches in NC to "re-imagine" their mission and discover the path to long term viability, vitality and sustainability. Currently, 4 other churches along with St Philip in eastern NC are participating.

Phase 1 Accomplishments in 2018 at St. Philip included:

- -formation of a core team and participation in two off site training sessions with the NC ELCA Triangle area Planting Hope leaders/advisors and PH teams from the other churches that are involved
- held 3 meetings at St. Philip in December to share the results of the congregational survey and to expand the conversation around the results. The highlight of these meetings was the open, honest engagement with each other and a heightened understanding, respect and appreciation for the the issues most important to us collectively.

For Phase 2 beginning Jan 6, the Planting Hope team kicked off a Coffee and Conversation hour between services. Assisted by the Nurturing Relationships Small Group Ministry Team, we have completed the first 3 of 8 lessons from the book of Acts. These lessons provide a common foundation to prepare us collectively for re-imagining what God's call for St. Philip is. We have had great attendance at the first 3 sessions and hopefully attendees have found a safe environment for additional conversation, further building of relationships and discernment.

The next Triangle area Planting Hope meeting is scheduled for Feb 16 in Durham along with the other 4 churches that are participating. The theme for this meeting is "Making the Main Thing the Main Thing." This training will be to help congregational leaders make God's Mission/Purpose for their congregations the top priority, central to how the congregation lives and makes decisions. We cannot allow the building, people's personal preferences, money, or devilish distractions to become more important than God's mission for us.



Please plan to join us on Sundays from 10-10:45am in Kepley Hall for our upcoming Coffee and Conversation sessions. The entire Planting Hope/Nurturing Relationships teams are excited as we continue to build strong relationships by exploring the Scripture in a deeper and meaningful way. Coffee and refreshments are provided.

The first trip of the year has been taken and in the words of a "Planting Hope" trainee, the result was outstanding. That is, we gathered at 1:00 in the church parking lot and immediately went into a huddle with Pastor Jim. While the pastor did not go, he was there to see us off, like the scene in Top Gun after Maverick messed up and was threatened with flying rubber replicas out of Hong Kong. I braced, said, "Yes Pastor," we shook hands and began the mission.

The first leadership decision of the day was when we had 3 drivers and 3 cars. LTC Edgar Helmey, USAF (ret.) recommended us all into his vehicle and I was told to move out. After a brief check ride in the technologically advanced Buick, we settled down to a scenic ride to the farm. On the way out I noticed large numbers highlighted on the all glass instrument display, Ed told me that was actually the speedometer and that he would not pay for my ticket.

Upon arrival at the farm we all marveled at the serenity of the moment. Then the short horn goats formed a skirmish line of 4 to 6 and advanced slowly towards us. Quickly swinging into action all of us did something: I laughed, Ed reminded us he was raised on a farm, Carole Mason squatted down to take it on the chin, while Farmer Mary interceded to herd the herd away until they got to know me better.

After becoming one with our inner goat and giving some serious ear scratching: we bonded with a burro; gazed at peacocks as they fanned and stowed their fans; we heard pigs snore, saw them wake and waddle around; chickens clucked; roosters cock-adoodled; the emus made a hollow sound akin to a log drum— they lay an egg that is a cross between an avocado and a small football. I felt sorry for the rabbits who are kept in cages, because they, well, multiply like rabbits.

Farmer Mary's dogs do her proud and are quite a talented lot, they included dogs that; played ball, were diplomatic ambassadors, shepherds to the flock, all of which enjoyed our visit.

Amid the suburban sprawl of our daily lives, Winterpast Farm is an island of tranquility that is teaming with diverse life. All manner of animal species made a fine effort, to get along with visitors to their homestead. The work and resources of time and money that are required, are but what is needed for a labor of love. To visit or volunteer at Winterpast Farm, is to interact with life on a most basic level, just as God must have intended.

Due to several factors, but especially the decline in new arrivals in the Raleigh area, Abundance Ministry will no longer operate as it has been.


