Dear Friends in Christ,

Imagine sitting in church on Easter Sunday and someone says "He is Risen!" Someone replies from somewhere in the sanctuary, "Say what?" Do you think that could perhaps be a little disturbing way to start Easter. How about you share the peace of the Lord with "Peace be with you" and the person responds with, "Why?" Responses to what is said can be surprising. Sometimes when we don't hear what we expect to hear we can be pretty surprised too. The power of words is really amazing. Then there is the power of God's words.

Take God's words in Genesis 1, "Let there be light, and there was light". Now that is using words with power. God just says it and it is so! That is the way it goes through the whole creation story in Genesis 1. God's word creates not just light but a dome, separate places for water and earth, plants, lights in the sky to tell time and seasons, living creatures and human beings.

With JUST HIS WORDS God has the power to create. If we have God's word don't we then have the power to create too? Maybe it is not just the words. Maybe it about how we use them, for what purpose. Could it also require some practice, training, or understanding. It may be dependent on the intent with witch God's word is used.


Especially as we enter into last weeks of Lent and our reflections on The Lord's Prayer and how we pray, enter Holy Week and then Easter—words are more and more significant. The words we use and the words we remember, take on a power not so different from Genesis 1. These words of Christ have power to forgive, reconcile, share His Life and His Spirit and bring us to new life in the resurrection. It is in the words that we are "called", renewed, and reconciled to God the Father and directed into lives of faith.

Given these wonderful gifts and power, let's make sure we hear the word to the core of our soul, know the word in our heads **and** hearts, consume the word and make it a part of us. Then see what God can create through us.

Join Us for a Lenten Meal and A Look at Prayer

Wednesdays - 6:30-7:30 through - April 10

As we approach Holy Week we will break bread together and look at one of the gifts God gave us in the form of prayer.

We began focusing on prayer during our I Love St. Philip stewardship campaign in the fall, when we prayed very intentionally each week for shared purposes and, finally, took the name of a congregant with the intention to pray for them throughout the year. During lent let's recommit ourselves to prayer and study together the prayer that Jesus taught us to pray, the Lord's Prayer.

Ministries throughout our congregation will host each week providing our meal as well as set up and clean up. Just bring yourself and your stories! This will provide another great way for us to listen to each other and learn more about ourselves.

Holy Week

The Sunday of the Passion/Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week and is unique in our liturgical cycle. The liturgy begins outside as we gather with palm branches and hear the account of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem. Once inside, the liturgy makes a dramatic shift as we turn to the reading of the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

Within this liturgy, the joy of Palm Sunday quickly moves to the sadness of what happens to Jesus after the welcome parade is over.

These shifts in mood remind us of the dramatic events that occurred between that triumphal entry and the death of Jesus on the cross.

We humbly and reverently move through this liturgy giving thanks that Jesus Christ is God for us and acknowledging that his death is the reality that gives us salvation. Together we proclaim "Hosanna!" Save us, Lord.

On <u>Maundy Thursday</u> we gather at Noon and at 7 PM. This liturgy includes four different emphases. First, we begin the service with confession. We end what we started on Ash Wednesday with what was absent then: a clear and personal statement of the gospel: "In obedience to the command of our Lord Jesus Christ, I forgive you all your sins."

The second emphasis is the New Commandment, that we love one another as he has loved us. It is from that commandment that this day receives its title. We will embody the command to love one another, as Jesus loves us.

The third emphasis is Jesus' gift of himself in the bread and cup and his commanding this as the way to remember him, the crucified and risen one. Finally, there is the foreshadowing of Good Friday with the stripping of the altar and leaving in silence at the end of the service.

When we return on <u>Good Friday</u> at Noon and at 8 PM it is to hear the passion according to John, sing the traditional hymns associated with the crucifixion, and to offer prayers for people in all conditions of life. The services focus on the contemplation and adoration of the cross, a means of death becomes the means of life and salvation.

At 8:00 we will have a Service of Tenebrae—the service of darkness is characterized by gradual extinguishing of candles, and by a strepitus (loud noise), taking place in total darkness representing the closing of Christ's tomb.

We will leave this service in silence.

Easter Sunday. Every Sunday is a celebration of the Resurrection of Our Lord because "on this day" as the Eucharistic Prayer of Thanksgiving states, Christ rose from the dead.

We gather on this day, like we do on all other Sundays, to give thanks to God for the salvation that God has prepared for us through the death and resurrection of Jesus. Empowered by the Holy Spirit through the Word of God proclaimed, the waters of baptism that makes us new creations, and the meal of Christ's body and blood, we are strengthened and sent out to bear Christ's redeeming love to the world.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

The city is full of non-profit organizations advocating and working for social justice that could really use our help. Also, no trip to Philadelphia is complete without a visit to Fairmount Park and the Liberty Bell!

Where will we stay while serving?

We will have housing at an ELCA congregation in the community in which we work. 10% of our registration fees are gifted to the host congregations for their ongoing mission in the community. At most of our sites this means that you will be sleeping on the floor, so be sure to bring an air mattress!

What does a typical day look like?

A typical day begins breakfast and devotions by 9am, followed by serving at a worksite until around 3pm. The late afternoon and early evening have time scheduled for showers, free time, dinner and a variety of evening events. The day concludes with worship, a time for church groups to check-in, and a little more free time before lights out. Sleep fast after a full, fun and meaningful day!

These events take advantage of some of the cultural attractions in the community we are serving, as well as simply providing opportunity to be social and get to know and spend time with old and new friends alike.



Christus Victor started a new worship schedule last September. We expanded from 1 worship service in the Sanctuary with both a choir and a small band, to 2 very different worship experiences and the same Jesus. Stories of the Generations

During Sunday school (10:10-10:50) in Kepley Hall, we have so far offered the gift of listening to panels of St. Philip folks from Generation Z and Pre-Baby Boomer/Older Baby Boomers. It has been enlightening hearing the stories these generations have shared. Following each panel discussion we engaged in small group discussion around what we have learned about and from each generational panel, and how we might be able to better serve and pray for each.

Gen Z Panel / Youth - Major Themes:

- Hang out time includes video gaming, talking,
- watching Netflix, communicating through texting or social media
- Texting and social media open room for connections across the world
- Education needed to achieve career goals often passes undergraduate degrees requiring masters degrees and a good deal of experiential learning through service hours or internships, etc.
- Their fears have a common theme of school shootings: Schools have overreacted and now students feel overprotected which exacerbates fear
- Most are self taught. New information comes rapidly so they rely on Google, YouTube
- Passionate about social justice
- They are comfortable talking about their faith but respect views of others
- They are engaged with faith-based programs: Youth Group, LYO, TEC
- Try to live out faith through behavior, attempting to show God's love to the world
- They desire to influence society and make a difference. Their key word: action
- Teens are over scheduled and sleep deprived.

- Developmentally, teens need 9-9.5 hours of sleep.
 Sleep supports their developing brain, as well as physical growth spurts and hormone changes.
- In order to prepare a successful resume for college entrance HS kids are focused on having plenty of service, leadership, and extra curricular activities (varying in type). They also apply themselves to the most vigorous class load they can manage including many taking AP (college level) classes.
- Here's some math for a hypothetical student: 30 min to get ready and have breakfast+ 6.5 hours in class + 1 hour travel (30 min there/ 30 min back, traffic) + 2.5 hours for after school activities + 1 hour for dinner/down time (+ 3.5 hours of homework + 9 hours of sleep = 0 remaining minutes.)
- Shorter Attention Span....Or Not?
- Because so much information is being thrown at young people at such an alarming pace, they needed to find a way to manage without missing out. The 8 second filter allows Gen Zs to see as much information as possible and, if in 8 seconds it does not pique their interest, they move on to the next piece.
- Today's teens have always lived in a world where terrorism and war are a constant and news is constantly available.

Pre-Baby Boomers/Older Boomers - Major Themes:

 Growing Up: Many on farm with hard work and little time for play at an early age. World War II changed the family dynamic. Responsibility assumed at very young ages.

- Toys: Simple-dolls, pocket knife, tool kit, the great outdoors.
- Hanging Out: Youth got together with a sense of purpose (church, school, clubs) not for social reasons (chores not play).
- Communication: All communication done face to face (ring the doorbell). Few had telephones and for those who did it was for adult use only. Best communication was by letters, especially to soldiers.
- Holiday Traditions: Christmas, usually only one gift per family member. Went to church service. Few traditions during WWII.
- Wanted To Be: Engineer, Pilot, Math/Science, Lawyer, Pharmacist
 - Lawyer: Father said he would send his daughter to college to become a Lutheran School Teacher or Nurse only
 - Pharmacist: became pharmacy tech through an apprenticeship that led to schooling to become a translator for a pharmaceutical company.
 - Engineer: Undergraduate degree earned al lat once or in spurts as money allowed. Had to seek further math education from the principal of the high school since only simple math was taught.
- Global Event: WWII and Vietnam War, Draft, Civil Rights
 - WWII made everyone "have to grow up" and had to be "dependable" and "useful"
 - WWII kicked off a technology explosion that we still build upon today
 - During WWII, living in Germany as Christian, there was tremendous impact of brainwashing of citizens as the master race that lasts until today in its impact.
 - Dealing with the draft for Vietnam leaves emotional impact still
 - Observing the civil rights movement from a place of limited diversity was impactful.

- Toughest Issues of Today: Personal health (especially mental health), poverty and making resources last, climate change for our children and grandchildren
- Who Passed Faith To You: Mom, Dad, Grandmother, Wife
- Try to live out their faith showing Jesus to the world. "They'll Know We Are Christians By Our Love"
- The pre-baby boomers and baby boomers have witnessed WW2, Korean War, Great Depression, New Deal, Rise on Corporations, Space Age, Civil Rights, Vietnam War, Sexual Revolution, Cold War/Russia, Space Travel, Watergate, Energy Crisis, Corporate Downsizing, End of Cold War, 911, the War on Terror...
- The pre-baby boomers and baby boomers have seen incredible change in technology as well.
 Some include: electricity, phones, tv, records streaming music, computers, internet, cell phones, car technologies, ATM machines and credit cards, and so so much more!
- Pre-baby boomers and older baby boomers were often raised in a time of economic uncertainty and a lack of modern luxuries

St. Philip Youth Ministry Leaving Footprints

Message from Cathryn Hewett Director of High School Ministries

Have you ever found yourself wondering why there is a picture of a dozen youth enjoying a meal in the basement or a picture of our group from LYO Assembly with 20 youth and yet there are only 2-3 present on a Sunday morning? Of course, part of that is due to folks being able to attend some weekends and not others. But there's more to it.

St. Philip youth ministry includes approximately 22 high school and 10 middle school youth members. Of those youth about 23 are active in some way whether that be youth group, worship, bells, Crossing band, and more, or a combination of these. That means that approximately 72% of our youth members are active at St. Philip. This is actually quite wonderful!

The footprint of the youth ministry of St. Philip extends beyond our members to those of Grace Lutheran. We have been combining for youth group for about 4 years. We offered to share youth group with Grace once learning that there weren't enough high school youth to maintain a youth group on their own. We have created a family that includes us all.

The footprint of St. Philip youth ministry stretches even further through our involvement at the synodical level. We boast 2 youth on the LYO board, 1 youth participant in the synod band, and the majority of the high school youth are active in TEC. Through these experiences, we have gained many friends throughout the synod. As a result, when we attend synod retreats, national gathering, and the like, it's like a reunion with other members of our faith family.

Through these acquaintances and friendships, we hear from youth whose churches may not be active at the synodical level, don't have access to mission trip opportunities, or even a regularly meeting youth group. Well, of course, St. Philip youth ministry adopts them!

Recently I was having a conversation with a friend who lives in Nashville, TN. He's a member of one of the fastest growing churches in Nashville. They might be classified as a mega church. We got to talking about how they got so large. His comment was they made it a mission to attract the youth. He said, "if the kids come, the parents will follow." He went on to say that many parents want to get their kids in church but with all the outside activities, it's hard for the parents to force the kids to go to church. But, if it becomes the kid's idea, it's easy. So, this church built a gymnasium, had athletic programs for the kids.

They held a bunch of other activities and really focused on the kids. And sure enough, the parents followed. Over the years, kids have graduated and left but many of the parents have stayed in their congregational home.

I was talking with a member of St. Philip and sharing this story and I was told that their congregation in Florida made it their mission to attract and prepare youth for carrying the message to the world once they left their church. Again, kids would stay 3, 4 or 5 years, graduate and leave, but they had instilled in the kids a sense of ministry and who's they were and carried it out to the world.

As I look around, Ravenscroft School is across the street. Millbrook schools are just down the road. The elementary school at the corner of Harps Mill and Falls of Neuse is being rebuilt and will be huge. There is Durant Elementary and Middle Schools. We have 80 children in our preschool and few if any parents are members of St. Philip. There's a lot of kids all around us and I'm sure they aren't all involved in church.

We have a lot of ministries at St. Philip. Look around. There are a lot of us who have grey hair. I know many, if not most of us, love to see and hear the kids around the church and miss the days when there were more. We don't need to cut back on the ministries that are serving those of us with grey hair, but let's think about how we can enhance and maybe add to those that do serve and attract the youth. If successful, we'll have to get their parents involved. Let's make more of an effort to talk to and include the youth. There's a neat program that has gotten started on Wednesday evenings. Talk with Kathryn Edwards about sharing a meal with the youth and spending some time with them. It helps them to know us and us to know them better. It all goes to build our family.

There's a growing energy among this congregation. I'm hopeful and excited about what this year is going to bring.
