Pastor's Message

July is the month we celebrate our nation's independence from Great Britain. July 4th is the date, of course, and it is often associated with baseball, hot dogs, fireworks, and American flags. I love all those things and so much more about America.

The first reason I love our country is because, quite simply, it is home. It is all I have ever known (apart from brief visits to other countries). I love our mountains and beaches and plains. I love our colleges and universities. I love our professional and collegiate sports. I love our art and music and culture and museums. I love our history (some horrible periods notwithstanding). I love our people. And I love the freedoms and opportunities our nation affords us. No wonder so many people around the world want to come here and make this their home. I often tear up at the playing of our national anthem when one of our Olympians is awarded a gold medal. Hopefully, that will happen often at this summer's upcoming Olympics.

The second reason I love America is because of our founding documents. In my opinion, they are historically brilliant. From the Declaration of Independence to the Constitution to the Bill of Rights. I remember being fascinated by the Federalist Papers when studying them in college. Not only are the words and phrases inspirational and moving, but they were hammered out carefully in a spirit of hardfought compromise. To attempt to strike a balance between the executive, legislative, and judicial branches - with an accompanying system of checks and balances - is a remarkable development in the history of world government. The effort to be fair in representation which resulted in a two-chamber Congress (the House of Representatives and the Senate) is also a stroke of brilliance.

Many of us get frustrated with the perpetual gridlock in government, but to me that just indicates that we

are gridlocked as a people – not because our system is inherently flawed. In a polarized society such as ours, it would make sense that we would elect polarizing figures.

It would be nice to have politicians willing to work "across the aisle," and hopefully some moderate voices would soon be able to do that. But I've always thought our issues as Americans - not entirely, but in large measure -- have more to do with the state of our hearts rather than the wording of our founding documents. The historical oppression of women and racial and sexual minorities in our nation is a glaring stain on our legacy, to be sure. Forbidding women the right to vote, enslaving African-Americans, and the near genocide of the American Indian are horrific chapters in our nation's history. But the problem is not in our ideals as much as it is in the failure to apply those ideals equitably. In other words, the sentiment "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness" (from the Declaration of Independence) is noble and worthy; the problem is that we have defined "men" too narrowly (meaning only white, land-owning men at the time). But change "men" to "people" - at least in our understanding, if not in the document itself - and you have an unparalleled national founding document.

The last reason I love our nation (and I'm painting with broad brushes here in this column) can be summed up in the phrase "at least we're trying." I read an article a year of so ago which pointed out that – despite all the turmoil and negativity and injustice in our society – that America alone is trying to build a diverse, inclusive democracy. The author pointed out that most other nations are highly homogenous and are content to remain that way. No other nation welcomes all types of people the way America does.

Most other countries try to limit the number and influence of those it considers outside its national identity. Only America tries to welcome everyone and then tries to democratically make sense of it. The author also pointed out that only America tries to honor its diversity by allowing hyphenated identities. For example, we have African-Americans, Asian-Americans, Hispanic-Americans, Jewish-Americans, etc. But other countries don't have that. You don't hear about Anglo-Chinese, African-Hungarians, or Jewish-Bolivians, for example. Only American seeks to honor people's racial, ethnic, and cultural backgrounds, while at the same time affirming their American identity. E Pluribus Unum: "out of many, one." We are constantly, tirelessly chasing after the "one," while not negating the "many." One could argue no other nation is even making an attempt at that. You could certainly do a lot worse. We have a long way to go in many ways. And yet we have also come a mighty long way. When asked whether America had formed a monarchy or a republic (a representative form of democracy), Benjamin Franklin replied, "A republic...if you can keep it." We've narrowly been able to keep it down through the generations. Here's to hoping we can always do so.



Message from the Lutheran Coalition of Habitat for Humanity

This note is to update you on the exciting plans for the next Building Independence project and our upcoming Lutheran Build.



Over the past few weeks, we have had some great conversations about the next steps with Building Independence 2.0. Habitat Wake and Lutheran Services Carolinas are now exploring the concept of a homeownership model for the most abled persons with developmental disabilities. This team visited a uniquely designed Habitat project in Orange County that could be a model. In essence, the partnership is exploring a one story 6-8 unit "tiny home" townhome project of approximately 700 square feet each at our Lake Wheeler neighborhood, which also contains the inaugural Building Independence project. The focus is to develop a strong model and then replicate it not only in Habitat Wake, but other Habitat affiliates across Lutheran Services footprint. All of this sounds wonderful but is taking time.

The recommendation now is to invite the Lutheran Coalition to keep the plan of building in 2021-2022, but build a traditional Habitat home. We have some exciting Habitat projects in Cary and Apex, which we think Christ the King, Resurrection, Jordan, and Abiding Presence would particularly be very excited about. We are building 7 homes in Cary later this year and early next year. We are also building 9 homes in Apex roughly the same time frame. The thought is to rally the Lutheran Coalition around one of those homes as its 2021-2022 project and then rally the Lutheran Coalition around Building Independence 2.0 as its 2022-2023 project.



Thank you, United Way!

Families Together is excited to share that we have been awarded two grants from United Way of the Greater Triangle (UWGT). The first award is the Healthy Families Grant of \$150,000 which is renewable for another year if funds allow. Our second award is the Anti-Racism Accelerator Grant of \$25,000. We were one of 284 applicants to apply for UWGT funding this year and are honored to be among the 85 local nonprofits awarded grants. The Healthy Families Grant will go towards expanding our Affordable Housing Initiative and helping families stabilize in their new homes by providing up to a year of one-on-one counselling and case management, behavioral health support, connections to community resources, and life skills workshops. Additionally, families will have access to specialized financial health and employment support from our team, including credit repair, debt reduction, budgeting support, resume writing support, mock interviews, and employment connections.

2021 Spring Campaign

Families Together's Spring Campaign ended on May 31st and we are incredibly lucky to have had such amazing support from our church partners! Families Together raised a total of \$357,687.96 with \$97,917.58 coming from YOU! We cannot thank you enough for supporting Families Together at such an incredibly challenging time in lives of your churches and congregations. This support will make a tangible impact on the lives of the families we serve.

Emergency Housing Expansion

After months of planning, Families Together is excited to announce that we will be breaking ground on one of our big goals of this year's campaign: expanding our Emergency Shelter Units. The shelter provides immediate housing for families that are unsheltered (i.e. sleeping in cars or outside) along with intensive crisis and case management from our team until permanent housing is obtained. The goal of this project is to increase our shelter capacity from six units to 10 private apartment units by building a two-story addition on one of the two quads owned by Families Together.

The expansion will enable FT to accommodate various family makeups with six 3-bedroom units, three 2-bedroom units and an efficiency that can converted to a training space or children's playroom when not needed for shelter. Two of the 2-bedroom units will be able to be adjoined creating a 4-bedroom unit when needed for a large family. One of the new 2-bedroom units will be wheelchair accessible.

Message from the Finance Committee

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In May, our income was down a bit...and below budget for the first time this year. We remain in good shape however and we just ask everyone to continue your giving during the summer months when our income has tended to drop a bit in past years.

For the month, total income was \$38,167, or \$6,477 below plan, while expenses were \$39,066, or \$3,367 better than plan. Year-to-date through May, our income was \$260,760, or \$34,963 above plan. Expenses totaled \$204,042 and were \$33,515 under plan. For the year, income exceeded expenses by \$56,717.
